COMMITTED TO CLOSING THE ACHIEVEMENT GAP

By the age of three, low-income children have heard 30 million fewer words than their middle-income peers.* By kindergarten the word gap increases to over 40 million and the average low-income child has experienced only 25 hours of one-onone reading time while their middleincome peers have had over 1,000.**

Without a language and learning-rich home environment, not only are a child's development of language and literacy



skills hindered, their numeracy and social-emotional skills are also impacted. They have never been read to or explored a book on their own. Children who enter school this far behind struggle and are more likely than their "ready" peers to drop out.

The Literacy Coalition provides a variety of programs that support early literacy skills and school readiness. One of these is the Parent-Child Home Program (PCHP), a national, research-based early literacy home-visiting program that builds school readiness skills for two and three-year-old children from low-income families. The Children's Services Council selected the Literacy Coalition in 2009 to begin providing oversight of the Parent-Child Home Program for Palm Beach County. The services are delivered throughout the County by Boys Town South Florida, The Guatemalan-Maya Center and Lake Worth West Resident Planning Group.

READERCORPS KICKS-OFF AGAIN

The Literacy Coalition of Palm Beach County kicked off its 2018 **ReaderCorps** program during "Celebrate Literacy Week, Florida! 2018" the week of January 22 and it will run through April. The mission of ReaderCorps is to provide meaningful service opportunities for children and teens that make them excited about reading while supporting literacy in Palm Beach County.

Students from kindergarten through 12th grade – whether attending a public school, charter school, private school, or being homeschooled – can sign up for free to be a member of ReaderCorps. Members organize book drives, coordinate buddy reading programs, host literacy themed events at their school, form book clubs and participate in the Literacy Coalition's county-wide Read-a-Thon. 

ONE BOOK, ONE COMMUNITY



Thousands of adults, partners and sponsors joined the Literacy Coalition in the 9th Read Together Palm Beach County Campaign, a "one book, one community" initiative in which adults throughout the County read the same book at the same time. More than 30 events were hosted October through December at libraries, coffee houses, theaters and offices to bring the community together to discuss key themes in the book.

Our 2017 selected title was A Man Called Ove, a New York Times bestselling book by Fredrik Backman about ordinary people learning how to live together in a community. It explores themes of youth, aging, loss, reconciliation and redemption. We also celebrated Sweden, the backdrop of the book and home country of the author.

Literacy **AmeriCorps** members provide a variety of support services to children, youth, adults and families in Palm Beach County. Members are placed at various locations, called service sites, throughout Palm Beach County. Members may be assigned to family literacy centers where they work with parents and children, library programs serving adults or children, afterschool centers where they tutor children who are underachieving in reading, and adult literacy programs where they teach groups of adults who want to learn English. Some of our members serve at high schools as graduation coaches for students who are at risk of dropping out. One of the advantages of our program is the diverse array of service opportunities our members can experience. When they are not serving at their sites, they are out in the community giving their time to help other organizations with community service projects. Members provided 2,400 hours of service during Hurricane Irma at the Special Needs Shelter and Emergency Operations Center.

I have a student who was very unmotivated to read and always came in with a negative attitude. He would cover his face when reading and complain how much he hated reading every day. He was really hard on himself. He didn't feel that he was smart and felt worse when he would make mistakes. He was easily discouraged, but I always found a way to motivate him by explaining that, "You got a few wrong, but look at all the improvement you made."

After months of tutoring, expanding his vocabulary and fluency, I have seen his attitude, behavior and overall reading ability improve drastically. Our tutoring sessions are very different from where we started. He arrives eager to learn and ready to read. He's even reading at home now, something he never did before.


The Literacy Coalition is proud to announce that Will Schwalbe, author, entrepreneur and journalist,



HELP US BUILD BETTER READERS

The Literacy Coalition provides two important programs with the help of community support. We are in need of funding for both programs, which are integral to helping children learn to read and to helping them develop into lifelong readers.

BUDDING READERS



Parents go out of their way to tell us how much the **Budding Readers** program has helped their children. The common theme is gratitude as expressed in this comment from a mother:

"Your program is truly a blessing. It makes me feel great that Julian enjoys reading. It's the biggest stepping stone."

She's right. This program for three-yearolds provides a critical foundation in the development of early literacy skills to prepare children to succeed in school and in life. By working one-to-one with the children, our Reading Partners incorporate print knowledge, phonological awareness, math, language and vocabulary into each session.

The result is the majority of these children are able to start school prepared and ready – and with a love of books and reading.

The children take home books from their sessions including popular favorites like *The Very Hungry Caterpillar* and *Chicka Chicka Boom Boom*. The children are excited to start their own home library.

The children's parents receive guides to encourage further reading and sharing of the book along with an activity that complements the book. This promotes interaction between the parent and child centered around reading, while helping parents play a role in their child's development of important literacy skills.

BUILDING BETTER READERS



What do a retired clinical psychologist, an advertising executive and a paralegal have in common?

A desire to:

- · do something meaningful
- help children
- pay it forward
- and be a literacy volunteer tutor

In Palm Beach County, nearly half of third grade students read below grade level. To address this need, the Literacy Coalition, in partnership with the School District of Palm Beach County, is in our fourth year of providing the **Building Better Readers** program. We recruit, train and support community volunteers to tutor children with very limited reading skills as part of the program.

In the last year 136, volunteers tutored 299 first and second grade students in 25 schools and 19 volunteers tutored 29 children in first through fourth grade afterschool at our Blume Literacy Center. We are encouraged by the students' progress: 71% of the children met the program's goal to be at least 50 percent closer to reading on grade level by the end of the year. Even better, 51% of the first grade students were reading on grade level at the end of the school year.

"I brought a level F book for Emmanuel to read and he told me, "I can't read a level F, it's too hard. I read level E books." I told him that I was sure he could do it. I said, "You're going to be able to do this" and he said, "I am?" Lo and behold, he read it beautifully with my help, and he was so proud. Then he said, "Someday, I'm going to read all the way to level Z!"

Volunteers Help Change Lives



The Literacy Coalition celebrated the 2017 Read for the Record on October 19 by coordinating 415 local volunteers to read to 15,696 children at childcare centers and schools throughout Palm Beach County. The campaign helps to highlight the importance of early literacy and celebrate the power of volunteers reading to children. We are grateful for the local campaign support of PNC Bank.

The 2017 campaign featured the book, *Quackers*, by Liz Wong and the main event was held at the Blume Literacy Center with children from the Literacy Coalition's early literacy and family literacy programs. Celebrity readers Tania Rogers from WPTV NewsChannel 5 and

Cressman D. Bronson of PNC Bank read to the children.

Mayors and public officials participated in our annual competition to see which municipality would have the greatest number of community leaders reading. Thank you to the 224 municipality officials and staff members who read at 113 childcare centers to 12,413 children.

The Village of Wellington was the winner for larger municipalities and the Town of Lantana was the winner for smaller municipalities. Honorable mentions went to Boynton Beach, Palm Springs, Royal Palm Beach, Lake Worth and Greenacres. Thank you to everyone who participated.




