PREDATORS: OWLS (6-8)


KEY CONCEPTS:

- Predators are animals (and sometimes plants) that hunt other animals for food. The food being hunted is the prey.
- **Raptors**, such as owls, are birds of prey that have sharp beaks and talons for hunting.
- Dissections involve taking something apart methodically in order to study it. This is a great way to learn more about an animal and its habitat.
- Raptors eat prey whole, but are unable to digest the bones, fur and feathers. These leftovers are cast (spit out) in the form of a **pellet**.

LITERACY CONNECTION:

The <u>Guardians of Ga'Hoole series</u>, by Kathryn Lasky, takes you to a magical world where owls are at war and a young owlet rises to become a legend. To be an engaging writer, an author must understand their subjects – human or animal.

"I have had to slip out of my own skin and into the feathers or pelts of animals for my fantasy series about owls... To do this, I would first have to learn all about the habits, habitats and behavior of a particular animal." – <u>Kathryn Lasky</u>





ACTIVITY: OWL PELLET DISSECTION

Materials: tray, toothpick, forceps (tweezers), <u>owl pellet</u>, paper, pencil (optional – gloves, <u>pellet ID chart</u>)

- 1. Carefully unwrap and inspect the outside of the pellet.
- 2. Over the tray, gently pull apart the pellet (be careful not to break any of the bones inside it).
- 3. Use the forceps to remove small bones and a toothpick to separate the bones from the fur or feathers.
- 4. Sort the bones into groups. When finished, roll the last bits of fur between your fingers to find little bones or teeth that might have been overlooked.
- Once you've found all the bones, use an <u>identification key</u> to learn more. Owls can eat more than one rodent before making a pellet, look for multiples of the same bones.
 <u>Be sure to WASH YOUR HANDS when finished!</u>

EXPLORE: How many different kinds of animals did you find evidence of in the pellet? What can you conclude about the eating habits of the owl that made your pellet?
