# Leading through Reading

## Writing and Drawing History (3-5)

#### **READ**



In the book As Fast as Words Can Fly, a young boy is a writer. He listens to the enthusiasm of his father and writes powerful letters. At first, he writes the letters by hand and then he learns how to type.

When children write, it is powerful! Writing is not only a way to influence and document history, it is a fantastic way to manage fear, anger and anxiety. During this time, you may have less time to chat with friends, but you can write, and you can draw.

#### **ACT**

### **Make Your Own Journal**

If you have a spare notebook or blank sheets of paper, you can make a journal. The diagram to the right is an example of how you can set up each page in your journal. Try to:

- Write and draw in your journal everyday.
- Write the date or day of the week at the top of each page.
- Draw what happened in the day and write words to describe your picture.
- Write and Draw about things you could control and things you could not control.
- Describe one or more of the feelings that you had during the day.
- Before you finish, write or draw what was the best part of your day. There is positive in every day. Find something that you did well or something that you are grateful to have.
