

Being Different is Okay (3-5)

At times, we wish that we could be exactly like someone else, but it is our differences that make the world a wonderful place to be.

What if all flowers were identical in every way? What if they were all the same size, same shape, and same color? Would they still be as pretty? If you looked out the window and everything, the birds, bugs, trees, and the sky, were the exact same shade of green, would the view be as beautiful? Aren't differences what make the world so interesting?

Differences make people interesting too. We look different. We have different ideas. We have different talents and opinions. Some of us speak one language and others speak another.

In <u>Junkyard Wonders</u> by Patricia Polacco, Mrs. Peterson's class is known as a special ed class. The other children in the school call the students in Mrs. Peterson's class names. They call her class the junkyard because a junkyard is a place for things no one wants. Mrs. Peterson teaches her students that they are not throwaways. She helps her students learn to be proud of who they are. She says, "A junkyard is not a place of throwaways, it is a place of wonderous possibilities." Mrs. Peterson shows them that they have different skills and talents. She helps them to create amazing things together.
